Proposal Defense (For MSc & PhD Candidates)

The proposal defense session for FAST postgraduate students serves as the preliminary oral examination (Evaluation 1). The main motivation of the proposal defense session is to assure that the Faculty of Applied Sciences and Technology's postgraduate students' proposal and research plan are significant and holds befitting academic merit.

Procedure and Process

- 1. The proposal defense is compulsory for all FAST MSc and PhD candidates
- 2. The proposal defense must be carried out

Full Time	Semester 1 or Semester 2 (1 st year of study)
Part time	Semester 4 or Semester 5 (2 nd year of study)

3. The research advisor needs to provide the committee with the details listed below

*the proposed examiners (2 in total) are preferably an Associate Professor Dr or Professor Dr if the candidate is embarking on a PhD program.

- 4. The examiners will give their recommendation and suggestion towards the betterment of the research plan, methodology and the overall direction of the study.
- 5. The proposal can be rejected by the examiners and student(s) will have to redo the proposal defense if the proposal has fatal flaws in the proposed research design and data analysis and/or the proposed research activities are insignificance.
- 6. The **students** need to submit the **proposal** to the faculty **3 weeks before** the actual date of the proposal defense.

- 7. The proposal should consist of
 - a) Background of Study / Overview of Study
 - b) Problem of Statement
 - c) Research Objectives/ Research Questions
 - d) Scope of Study
 - e) Literature Review
 - f) Methodology and Research Design
 - g) Expected Outcomes and Preliminary Results
 - h) References
 - i) Gantt Charts

*It is compulsory for the candidate to provide the similarity index report (Turnitin) and the result should be less than 30 %

8. The candidates are given **15 minutes to present the proposal followed by 15 minutes Q&A** session.
